Course Title: Research Seminar in International Law – ILC Topics

Professor: August Reinisch

I. Course Description and Objectives

This seminar will address various topical issues in international law, as they are currently debated in the International Law Commission. Students will have to prepare short research papers which will be discussed and evaluated in class. The seminar aims at providing course participants with the required skills and knowledge for the preparation of a master thesis in the International Legal Studies program. Participants will have the unique opportunity to discuss issues currently debate in the International Law Commission with one of its members.

II. Course Outline

This course will track the specific topics currently discussed and likely to be discussed (in the near future) by the ILC. Other related topics may be added during the semester.

The course will be sequenced as a number of meetings during which the participants should be able to exchange their research experiences throughout the entire semester. The following are the main topics for research:

1. Protection of the atmosphere
2. Provisional application of treaties
3. Peremptory norms of general international law (*jus cogens*)
4. Protection of the environment in relation to armed conflicts
5. Succession of States in respect of State responsibility
6. Immunity of State officials from foreign criminal jurisdiction
7. General Principles of Law
8. Sea-level rise in relation to international law
9. Universal Jurisdiction
10. Dispute Settlement Concerning International Organizations
